THE DETROIT MUSEUM OF ART.

Annual Report for 1892-3.

At the last annual meeting of the corporation Messrs. James E. Scripps and Cyrenius A. Newcomb were elected Trustees. Subsequently the Mayor of Detroit, Hon. H. S. Pingree, appointed Mr. Richard Storrs Willis a Trustee on behalf of the City.

At the first meeting of the Trustees a declination was received from Mr. C. A. Newcomb and Mr. Bela Hubbard was chosen by the board to fill the vacancy.

The Trustees have held eight meetings during the year. It will be remembered that for the year ending May 1, 1892, the financial report showed a deficit of \$4,598.34 in the operating expenses of the institution. The board at its first meeting undertook such an adjustment of expenses that the balance sheet should show for the year just closing, at least, a material diminution of the deficit. The estimate of receipts and expenses was as follows:

The operations of the institution have been much retarded by want of space. The pupils have been uncomfortably crowded, lectures have been rendered an impossibility, and there has been no opportunity afforded for special exhibitions by which the interest in the museum could be kept up and the attendance of visitors encouraged and increased. The need of more room, indeed, has borne so heavily upon the Trustees that schemes for providing funds and adding another section to the building have been uppermost topics in the business of the year. The movement to raise \$30,000 for such extension has met thus far with the following pledges:

Leaving \$10,435 still to be raised by subscription. The board feel so confident that this will be made up by the wealthy and art loving citizens of Detroit that they recommend the immediate letting of contracts for the new building to the end that, at least, a portion of it may be in readiness for use at the opening of the next school year.

Application to the Common Council for an appropriation of \$5,000 towards the maintenance of the institution has this year been so far successful that that amount has been voted from the city's contingent fund upon condition of the museum being open free to the public. The appropriation will be available in July and the board recommend that from June 1st all admittance fees to the galleries be abolished.

From Mr. Bela Hubbard, 74 engravings of principal paintings in the Royal Gallery at Dresden. Also Thorwaldsen's works, illustrated, in four volumes.

From the heirs of the late Hon. H. H. Emmons, a miscellaneous collection of antiquities.

From Mr. Percy Ives, a charcoal drawing, the work of Louis D. Norton, an American student in Paris.

From Mr. Charles Gunther, Chicago, three photographs of his portrait of Columbus.

From various sources, 531 books and pamphlets, for the library.

Owing to lack of space but little opportunity has been afforded for special exhibitions, but during August and September Gen. R. A. Alger kindly loaned the museum his large picture by Munkacsy, entitled "The Last Hours of Mozart." This was followed by a collection of pictures loaned by Mr. George S. Davis. Mr. Albert Ludlow, of Waukesha, Wis., has loaned five paintings for an indefinite period. To Messrs. Goodrich Beal and Albert Wenzell, the museum is also indebted for the loan of drawings. Also to Mrs. Donn Piatt for the loan of five drawings by Edgar M. Ward.

The museum has been open 21 Sundays during the year at a nominal fee of ten cents.

The Executive Committee has held 12 meetings during the year.

The schools opened in October, 1892, under the charge of Mr. Edgar J. Bissell, who retired in November, and was succeeded by our former popular and successful teacher, Mr. Joseph W. Gies.

The corps of teachers for the past school year has been:

During the past year another of the original members of the corporation has been called away by death in the person of Hon. Henry P. Baldwin. Mr. Baldwin presided at all the earlier meetings of the institution and was very active in its organization. While ill-health had prevented in later years his active participation in the work, he maintained to the last his interest in the development and success of the museum, and testified the same by leaving to it a considerable collection of statuary and other works of art, which, by the terms of the will are to be kept together and known as the Baldwin collection. The gift will not be immediately available but the providing of room for it is another reason why the new building should be immediately proceeded with.

The death of Mr. Baldwin leaves the membership of the corporation below the minimum number, 40, and it will hence become the duty of the corporators at their approaching meeting to elect some one to fill the vacancy. The Trustees have united upon Mr. Bryant Walker as a fit person to recommend to the corporation for election to the same.

Another noticeable gift to the museum during the year has been an important group of Japanese statuary in wood. It represents an historic wrestling match which occurred B. C. 23 between a black giant and a powerful Japanese of the ordinary type, in which the latter threw and killed his antagonist. The generous donor is Mr. Frederick Stearns, who thus rounds out the splendid collection of Japanese curiosities heretofore presented by him to the museum.

On October 22nd, Mr. Chas. Waltensperger, who was awarded the foreign scholarship for 1891-92, sailed for Paris and entered the Julian school where he has since been at work.

On August 24th, Mr. George S. Davis offered to contribute the sum of \$1,000 to enable the school to establish a second foreign scholarship, which generous offer was duly accepted by the Trustees.

Substantial gain has been made in the school since last year in good order as well as in the deeper interest awakened and greater industry evinced. In all the classes more room is greatly needed and the want of a more extended library is very much felt. While heretofore the work of the academic department has been confined mainly to charcoal drawing, it is proposed the coming year to establish a class in still-life painting, as a step towards a head painting class which is looked forward to in the near future.


I do hereby give, devise and bequeath to the Detroit Museum of Art, a corporation organized and existing under the laws of the State of Michigan, with its home effice in said State—
