Annual Report for 1893-4.

At the annual meeting of the incorporators held May 1st, 1893, Mr. Bryant Walker was elected a member of the corporation, to fill the vacancy caused by the death of Ex-Governor Henry Baldwin.

Mr. Bela Hubbard, who had been elected a trustee to fill the unexpired term of Mr. C. A. Newcomb, was re-elected to serve two years.

Mr. D. M. Ferry, Mr. Bryant Walker and Mr. W. H. Brearley were also elected members of the Board of Trustees.

The terms for which Hon. Thos. W. Palmer, Mr. Fred. Stearns and Mr. L. T. Ives had been elected having expired, the following resolution was offered and passed unanimously:

"The Incorporators of the Detroit Museum of Art warmly recognize the invaluable services of each of these retiring members, and tender sincerest thanks to Mr. Palmer, the earliest benefactor of the Museum and its efficient President; to Mr. Stearns, for his thoughtful interest in the institution, even when in distant climes, and his munificent gifts; to Mr. Ives, whose faithful and most useful service can be appreciated only by those who know what it has proved to the School and to the Museum."

At the first meeting of the new Trustee Board held May 5th, the following officers were elected to serve during the ensuing year:

On motion which was adopted, Mr. Griffith was authorized to sign himself Director in the place of Acting Director.

The city council having made an appropriation of \$5,000 on condition that the Museum be opened free to the public every day in the week, it was decided thus to open the

Museum, beginning with June 1st.

At a meeting of the Trustees held October 7th, Mr. Bela Hubbard, chairman of the executive committee reported, that owing to the unfortunate wording of the ordinance which virtually limited the grant of \$5,000 from the city to an already exhausted fund, the controller, Mr. Moore, declined to draw his warrant for the money, but that a new resolution had been offered and passed by the city council and that the first instalment of \$1,000 had been paid to the Treasurer, Mr. Mumford, and that the remaining \$4,000 would be paid in sums of like amount each 60 days.

As soon as the summer heats set in it became apparent that the ventilation of the gallery of the Museum was entirely insufficient; particularly was this the case on Sunday afternoons, when the room was greatly crowded. This defect was remedied by opening the windows in the east, and cutting new ones in the west wall of the space over the gallery. It was also found necessary to purchase 150 extra chairs in order to accommodate the public attending the Sunday afternoon "Art Talks."

At the Trustee meeting of October 7th, Mr. W. H.

Brearley resigned as a member of the Board.

A special meeting of the Trustees was called by the President November 24th, when the crowded condition of the school and Museum was discussed, an effort made to increase the building fund, and bids for the addition ordered to be secured at once.

At this meeting the Director submitted a communication stating that he had an opportunity to accept a position with another institution at an increased salary, and desiring an expression of the Board as to whether his services would be wanted after the present year. The following was adopted:

The Board having been advised that the services of the Director have been sought by other institutions, hereby express approval of Mr. Griffith's management of the Museum and school and extend his term of office for one

year from May 1st, 1894.

January 13th, bids for the extension to the building, which included two wings and a court, were opened, and that of Chandler & Goddard for \$29,340.00 were considered the most favorable; but in order to secure these terms it was necessary to proceed with the work at once.

A resolution was passed requesting that these subscribers waive the condition as to the full amount being subscribed before work began, which was done, and the several subscribers having sent in their written consent, at a special meeting of the Trustees on January 26th Mr. D. M. Ferry, Mr. Sam'l R. Mumford and Mr. Bryant Walker were appointed a committee to sign contracts.

On January 31st, 1894, the addition to the building, so urgently needed, was commenced, and is now well advanced. It embraces an east wing with a handsome stone front 85 feet long and four stories high on Hastings street, a west wing of brick, four stories, and between these two wings a large statuary court, to be covered with glass. The first floor is well adapted for school rooms and will aid us greatly in giving better accommodations to the classes in the school.

The east wing and court are to be completed in September, giving ample time to get them in shape for the next school year.

During the year there have been twenty sessions of the Executive Committee, also three regular and two special meetings of the Trustees.

The number of visitors to the Museum for the past year has been, on Sundays, 18,127, and on week days, 43,074, making a total of 61,201, nearly double the number anticipated, showing the value of the Museum to the city. A similar appropriation has been made for this year. The Trustees of the institution, and with them the citizens of Detroit, generally, express their warm recognition to the City Government for thus caring for the enjoyment and the educational advantages secured to the people whose interests they have in charge.

It may be added, that the pupils of the public schools share in these advantages. Fully one-third of our visitors during the week are the scholars of the different city schools, who come not only for its novel and varied attractions, but because here they find an unlimited number of topics for their

school compositions, thus relieving both their teachers and themselves of the hitherto irksome task, in the one case of providing and in the other of finding subjects to write about.

During the year Mr. Frederick Stearns made a fine exhibit of about 400 water color drawings of the fish of the tropics, which attracted wide spread attention. He followed this with an equally attractive exhibit of oriental fabrics and other curios, which proved of great interest.

Hon. James McMillan has on exhibition some 50 paintings

and 11 pieces of marble.

A very valuable loan of 50 original black and white drawings was received from the Century Publishing Co., of New York, which are greatly appreciated by the students in the school.

Mr. Albert Wenzell has continued his loan of black and whites that were on exhibition last year.

Mr. Albert Ludlow, of Waukesha, Wis., has also continued his loan of five paintings.

Mr. Chas. Craighead, of Dayton, Ohio, loaned for a time a large painting of the birth of Christ.

The Museum is indebted to others for loans, as follows:

Mr. Wm. Courtis presented to the Museum a rare basket, the work of the Pima Indian women.

Mrs. O' Gallagher Allen, a good specimen of old crown Derby ware.

The ladies of the Columbian Ball committee, a large bronze statute of a dancing boy from the Woman's building at the World's Fair.

The Imperial Japanese Commission of the World's Fair, a large panel painting representing one of their games.

Mrs. Helen Livingstone, a collection of photographs of famous Italian carvings.

Hon. T. W. Palmer, five frames containing historic manuscripts.

Mr. Frederick Stearns, a number of terra cotta figures, representing the costumes of India, also the shell of a Giant crab.

Hon. H. S. Finney, a fine specimen of Tarantula and Nest.

Mrs. Dr. Burrows, specimen of a Sea Horse.

With these it is hoped a beginning may be made of a Natural History department, which will greatly add to the educational advantages of the Museum.

We are also indebted to the South Kensington Museum Art School for the gift of a very fine model from life of a Nude Boy, by John Hughes, which was greatly admired in the British section of the World's Fair.

Mr. Henry Vollbracht gave a fine cast to the modelling class.

With the consent and entire approval of Mr. Frederick Stearns we have re-arranged 28 cases containing the collection given by him. This will be continued until all the cases are completed.

Soon after the Museum was made free we noticed the difficulty the general public experienced in reading the written labels. A Remington type-writer was purchased and the work of copying the labels begun. This work has been done at odd hours, but so far as we have been able to complete it, it is greatly appreciated by all visitors.

About the close of the World's Fair Mr. Bela Hubbard and Mr. D. M. Ferry each subscribed \$50 toward defraying the expense of the Director to Chicago in the interest of the Museum and school. The results have been very gratifying and more will follow, as avenues were opened by which we shall be in closer relations with kindred institutions abroad.

One of the features of the past year has been a series of Sunday afternoon talks, before adverted to, on topics relating to art. These have attracted a wide interest, not only among our own citizens, but in other cities, where the press has given them extended notice. In all, there have been given 34, and at many of them it has been impossible to accommodate the great number who wished to attend. These will be resumed again in October.

The demands on those connected with the Museum have been much greater this year than ever before, owing to the largely increased attendance, which has required more careful attention in looking after the collections, and in meeting the public and enlisting their interest in the Museum and school. Mr. Griffith's efficient and valuable services as Director, his entire devotion to the interests of the institution, his tireless assiduity in promoting them, his many-sided qualifications for the position he holds, have contributed not a little to the signal success of the Museum and school.

Mr. Bradish, who has remained as his secretary, has filled the duties of his position with a fidelity that is creditable to himself and satisfactory to all.

It was found necessary to have another man as care-taker. This position has been filled by Paul Nordstrom, who has also been a pupil in the school, and he has proved willing and anxious to please.

In making up the estimates of anticipated receipts for the year, it was thought the school ought to bring in \$2,300. The actual receipts from tuition have been \$2,876.65, showing a gain of \$576.65 over what was thought possible.

The school has been kept in operation under great disadvantages owing to the lack of room and the general disturbance necessarily connected with construction. The teachers have shown more enthusiasm, have been more faithful to the interests of the school, and have worked more earnestly for its efficiency than ever before, willingly devoting extra time in order to secure success.

We regret that Mrs. E. G. Holden, who has been with the institution from the start, will sever her connection with the school to take up her residence in another city. Not only shall we miss her experienced guidance in art studies, but her cultivated companionship, and the souvenirs she suggests of the early Art-Loan days, whose aspirations are now realized in the present superb Museum.

Over 500 drawings were handed in from the pupils of the public schools in competition for the annual scholarships.

The school and its work have attracted attention and received many flattering notices in the press of other cities, and it is believed that the coming year will show a marked advance in numbers and in work.

We are more than ever convinced that while the standard of excellence in the Fine Art department must be kept at its best, there must be more and more attention given to industrial art. It is the educated artisan and skilled mechanic who makes his home among our manufacturers and leading industries, where there is a constantly increasing demand for better workmen and particularly for men who can put plans and designs on paper.

We owe a good share of our success in the school to the Library, which has increased considerably during the past year, both by donation and purchase; the largest donation being 42 volumes from Miss Clara Avery, one of the choice spirits in art, whose influence has ever been quietly but sensibly felt by the lovers and cultivators of the Art Beautiful in Detroit. Senator James McMillan has also given 5 volumes on the Universal Exposition held in Paris, 1889, and 8 volumes on Ethnology. W. T. Walters, of Baltimore, Md., 4 volumes on art. The Spanish Commission at the World's Fair, a number of books of design, and we are indebted to publishers all over the country for contributions of periodicals to the number of nearly 1,500; and while many of them are not directly allied to art, they are all valuable as showing how widely the Museum and school are known.

From all sources there has been received in cash for the Library the sum of \$168.78 and paid out \$178.34. The books are in constant use by all the older students.

It has been suggested that a lunch room be fitted up in

the new building. This can be done at little expense and would add much to the welfare of the school, as many of the young men and women come to the five o'clock sketch class bringing a light lunch in order to remain for the evening classes. By the addition of a small gas stove on which they could make a cup of cocoa or coffee, this room could be made a pleasant place in which to spend the off hours by those who come a long distance, besides cultivating a companionable feeling among the students. The room could also easily be supplied with reading matter without expense.

The teachers for the past school year have been:

The classes in color, oil and water, both portrait and still life, which were started this year, have made very good progress. These have been in charge of Mr. Gies and Mr. Haefeker, and have added to the general interest of the work, it being the beginning of the study of color by the more advanced students.
