THE GUILD OF BOSTON ARTISTS



HE Guild of Boston Artists is a co-operative body whose aim is to further the interest of the members by promoting the sales of their pictures. The Active Members include thirty-three

painters, six sculptors and six miniaturists. There is also an Associate Membership which far outnumbers the Active Membership, made up of prominent art connoisseurs of Boston and other cities.

The Guild has taken a house at 162 Newbury Street, in Boston, just one block from Copley Square, and by remodelling the front and taking out partitions, and by adding a low gallery with a skylight at the back, has converted it into a very desirable exhibition and salesroom, both as to location and equipment.

The Active Members are in turn entitled to individual exhibitions of one fortnight each in one of the Guild Galleries during the season. Each Active Member also contributes one work of art to be placed on continuous exhibition in the other gallery, so that in one room an individual member has a one-man show, while in the other all the artists are represented in a general exhibition.

To maintain this mutual benefit salesroom the Active Members are required to pay \$100 each upon entering the Guild, and a yearly assessment not exceeding \$100 in any subsequent year. Associate Members pay no entrance fee, but contribute \$10 a year toward the running expenses of the Guild.

The sending out of this traveling exhibition is another step in the progress of the Guild, and it is with much pleasure that the Detroit Museum of Art presents the collection in its galleries.

THE DETROIT MUSEUM OF ART

is open to the public on week days from 9 a. m. to 5 p. m.; on Sundays from 2 to 6 p. m.; on holidays from 2 to 5 p. m. It is also open frequently in the evening for the display of special exhibitions and for lectures. The Museum is free to the public on all occasions.

The collections of the Museum include the James E. Scripps collection of paintings, comprising eighty-five pictures belonging to the early Italian, Flemish, Dutch and French Schools; the Edward Chandler Walker collection of paintings, including works by Isabey, Troyon, Hoppner, and a number of the best examples of Gari Melchers; the Charles Willis Ward collection, containing several fine examples of the work of contemporary artists, and a collection of paintings by present-day American artists, acquired by purchase and gift.

The Frederick Stearns collection comprises objects illustrating the habits and customs of the peoples of China, Japan, and the South Sea Islands; collections of the American Indian and Egyptian Archaeology, and Scientific collections, including Mineralogy, Conchology, and other branches of natural history.
